

Pastor's Page

Grace & Peace to you,

As you know you and I are in the midst of the Lenten season. I was one time asked what the word "Lent" meant. I was stumped. I could give the answer of what it meant theologically. It is the forty days before Maundy Thursday when faithful Christians prepare themselves for Easter through prayer, repentance, penance, and self-denial or fasting. It is the time when we take a serious look at our personal faith.

I did some research on the actual meaning of the word "Lent." It is derived from the Old English word *lencten*, meaning 'spring', the lengthening of days after winter is over. This was a period of spring fasting known in Old English as *Lencten-Fasten*, or in its abbreviated form, as *Lencten* or Lent. The ecclesiastical name for this once mandatory period of fasting is the *Quadragesimal Fast* (Latin), or the fast of the Forty Days, in imitation of the forty days of fasting performed by Jesus in the wilderness.

As we travel though these forty days and forty nights, I have to ask myself... and you, "How are we doing at reflecting on our personal faith... what are you doing to focus on God and the life and ministry of Jesus?" A couple of things I hope you have done, and will do are: I hope you were able to attend the Feed My Starving Children MobilePackTM; I hope you will be able to attend one of the opportunities to be part of our all church study called "The Sacred Echo". The readings help us listen for the echo of God's voice in our prayer and daily life; and I hope you will attend Holy Week services coming up in April.

As the spring days stretch a little longer this Lenten season... try stretching your faith and commitment to Christ. Your never know, you may learn to experience Easter every day.

STEWARDSHIP NOTES:

- Pledge income for January was 20% higher than pledge income in January 2022 and non-pledge income was 4 times higher than January 2022, due to two one time unpledged gifts.
- 2. Overall expenses were significantly lower (65%) than January 2022.
- Total Income was \$65,911; total expenses were \$40,558; leaving a Net Income of 3. \$25,353 for January, a very good start for the year.
- A budget for 2023 was adopted at the February 27 Session meeting. Pledges increased by \$36,411 to a total of \$548,651. Total Income is budgeted at \$657,314 with Total Expenses budgeted to be \$662,605, resulting in a projected Net Income of (\$5,291). The Mission portion of the budget is \$66,845 or 10% of overall expenditures. It is anticipated that additional building use income will offset the budgeted negative net income by the end of 2023.
- 5. The congregation's response to the need for increased pledges was inspiring and made it possible to adopt the budget with a minimal deficit and an opportunity to reverse that deficit before year end 2023. Thank you, thank you, thank you!
- 6. The Stewardship chart will return in the next newsletter.

Session The Session met for its regular stated meeting on February 27. Here are some highlights:

- As described in more detail in the Stewardship Notes in this newsletter, Session adopted a budget for 2023. The budget was made possible by members' very generous additional pledges and gifts.
- The Missions Committee portion of the approved budget reflects 10% of Pines' expenditures. Session approved specific benevolences totaling over \$41,000, 70% of the Missions' budget. Missions has also planned for 5% of its budget to support other church committee outreach efforts in the community.
- Session has called an Annual Meeting of the Congregation for March 12 following Worship. The Congregation will be asked to vote on the 2023 Terms of Call for Rev. Gans, to elect a trustee for a 3-year term, and to elect members of the 2023-24 Congregational Nominating Committee. Session approved the Terms of Call recommended by the Staff Committee, to be voted upon at the Annual Meeting.
- Session elected Shirley Bollich, Judy Shamp, Linda Johnson, and Chris Wolfe (as an alternate) as Ruling Elder Commissioners to the Presbytery of New Covenant's meeting on March 18 in Navasota.
- Linda Johnson was elected to be the Vice-Moderator of the Congregational Nominating Committee.
- Session approved Rev. Barbara Retzloff to officiate the worship service and Communion at the Presbyterian Women's Spring Gathering to be hosted at Pines on April 22. A reserve of \$200 for incidental expenses incurred by Pines for the gathering was also approved.
- Session approved on second reading a full revision to the Policies and Procedures Manual.

CTEDITENI Tending to Grief by Ann Guerra



In Megan Devine's book, *It's OK That You're Not OK*, she talks about tending to our grief. She encourages people to see grief as a natural response to death; grief is not a problem to be solved but an experience to be tended.

The idea of "tending to grief" resonated with me since the first time I read it in 2019. I immediately thought about it like tending a garden. In the beginning, a lot of attention is given to loosen the soil, fertilize, plant and water. After my husband died, all I could do was constantly think about what happened, how I was missing him, what could I have done to stop it, worry about the future and ask the same questions over and over again.

After the garden is set, the gardener walks away and lets nature "happen." Rain, sun, animals, insects, weeds, pollution, etc. all have an effect. Some are positive, others are not. People, places, and things all influence grief. Some are positive, some are not.

The gardener comes back and tends to what has happened. Maybe all is well. (Peace) Maybe weeds have overtaken and suffocated the seedlings. (Fear) Maybe animals have raided the bounty. (Anger) Maybe insects are everywhere but the plants are "fine." (Denial) Maybe the garden is dry. (Sadness) The gardener has so many things to tend to; the griever has so many things to tend to.

When I think about tending to my grief, there are those days I'm really paying attention to it. I really get into tilling the soil, if you will, trying to figure out what life is going to look like or continuing to be in disbelief. The days go on, things continue to grow. The world doesn't stop. It makes me think of the weeds in the cracks in the sidewalk and the roads- they pop up anywhere. They're unruly and messy and out of place. My grief does that- just pops up out of nowhere. It can be unruly. It can be messy and it can certainly come at times when it's out of place.

There are even times when grief pops up and I don't have the energy to deal with it. It's like those weeds in the garden. I know they are there. I don't like that they are there, but I don't want to deal with it. I have learned that if I don't take care of those weeds, my garden becomes overwhelmed, and doesn't thrive. If I don't stop and pay attention when my grief starts to surface again, all sorts of things can happen.

I don't look for grief, but I do believe once we have a significant loss, the grief is never completely gone. We grieve because we have loved. Grief never ends because love never ends.

Megan asks us "...to tend to pain and grief by bearing witness. By neither turning away, or by pushing redemption, but by standing there, right there, inside the obliterated universe. By somehow making a home there...A place that honors the full breadth of grief, which is really the full breadth of love."

The gardener works hard to grow the most exquisite flowers and delicious produce. As I tend to my grief, life will never be as it was, but it can be beautifully different. There are times when the gardener needs help or support because the task of tending to the garden can seem overwhelming. Similarly, in any part of our life journey, we can feel overwhelmed with challenges. At those times, I would encourage you to consider working with a Stephen Minister- someone who will come into your life to support your efforts to move forward. 

Presbyterian Children's I just wanted to share a short client success story with y'all and feel free to share with others!

I began working with a new client a few months ago who had just received guardianship of his 7 year old brother. He was removed from a life of living out of motels, no education, never knowing when he was going to eat next, exposed to witnessing drug abuse and so much more. PCHAS services have helped this little family with parenting, stability, guidance and emotional support all while trying to gain resources and services that he desperately needed. At one point the first & only school the boy has attended even asked the family to move the boy to the "correct" zoned school according to his "paperwork" which was no longer current and the family was discouraged and hopeless as so many strides had been made in his therapeutic services. Over and over these new "parents" were told no, turned away and were losing hope. I encouraged persistence, provided guidance and helped with confidence and together we wrote letters to those who were going to make that decision and for the services he desperately needed. Advocating for this boy paid off and today I received this...



For a young couple who never anticipated being "parents", I am so proud we were able to help them and continue to provide services that will ensure a better life for this sweet boy.
