

Pastor's Page

Greeting in the name of our Lord,

November is here and it seems we have officially entered into the fall season. Our temperatures have finally fallen, we are turning our clocks back, our days are getting shorter, Thanksgiving will be here before you know it, and the church calendar is getting full. I'm so thankful for fall, not only because of the cooler weather, but because it seems the church comes alive again. There is so much going on for which we can be thankful.

November is the traditional time of year we remember and give thanks to God for all God has given us. A few weeks ago, I preached a sermon about being thankful. Staff Spotlight | Tim Holder



Who is this man who tickles the ivories each Sunday in a way that draws us all closer to God? Tim Holder has been blessing the Pines family of faith with his God given gifts for over five and a half years. As the Director of Music Ministries, Tim Holder oversees the complete music ministry at Pines. Tim prayerfully selects the major pieces of music for each worship service while also skillfully directing the Chancel Choir, Men's and Women's Chorale, and Pines Orchestra. Tim also shares his gift of music, and his desire to serve, with several area senior living establishments. Tim enjoys sharing the Gospel through music with these older adults by having hymn sings and even creating small choirs within the facilities. The residents at the senior living establishments love that Tim comes to share what so many of them have been missing for years since they cannot attend their home church to enjoy worshiping through song.

Tim has been playing music almost his entire life, and it shows. Tim has many gifts, but he feels his greatest gift is the ability to take a piece of music for any

group that he directs and adapt it to that particular group using the voices or instruments God has given him for that rehearsal or service, rewriting parts or putting the music in a different, more singable key. If you asked Tim what brings him the greatest joy, or fulfillment about his ministry here at Pines he would say when a member of the congregation comes to him after service or writes a note expressing how a particular song in the service touched their heart. One of his greatest fulfilments comes on Wednesday evenings during choir

rehearsal when the music is so beautiful, the voices blend so well, the harmony is just so perfect that it brings tears to his eyes. Speaking of tears, Tim says God has blessed him with a tender heart so he can minister in music to the choir, the congregation, and the residents of the retirement centers he visits. He says this tender heart easily brings him to tears. His sister once told him, "You cry watching a Hallmark commercial!" Tim thanks God for the blessing of a tender heart.

Now that you know a little bit more about Tim, I hope you'll stop him in the hallway, or stick your head in the choir room following worship and say hello. You will be blessed by his spirit.



The Music Department

Greetings from the Music Department!

We recently sang the hymn "Give Thanks" in our Worship service. I would like to tell you how that particular hymn came to be written.

Henry Smith must have viewed life this way: God's side of the equation always far outweighs whatever is on the other side. He wrote the words "give thanks" six times in the opening phrase of the song, even though he was struggling to find steady work, despite having just earned a college degree. When he says "the poor" are rich in the song, that's an echo from his difficulty finding work. His eyesight was also failing because of a degenerative condition that would eventually leave him legally blind, certainly a "weakness" that he expressed in the song as his eyesight faded.

Thankfully, theological training informed him that God's side of the equals sign was what mattered. Other parts of his life further motivated the song that came directly from his heart. He had found someone to love, his future wife. And he was grateful to be through school, which his poor eyesight had made difficult. He was also glad to be back in his home church in Williamsburg, Virginia.

If God was all that Henry Smith had in 1978, when the song was written, then He could be praised, and yet God provided even more. It is no surprise that Henry's heart overflowed in this song:

Give thanks with a grateful heart; give thanks to the Holy One Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son. And now let the weak say, "I am strong;" Let the poor say, "I am rich," because of what the Lord has done for us. Give thanks!

While I have occasionally tried to convey my appreciation to our musical family, I confess that I often fall into the trap of taking for granted the countless hours they spend in preparing to share their musical talents in ways that enrich the spiritual lives of the Pines family and those included in their outreach efforts.

I hope you will join me in personally thanking our many musical servants for their ministry which lifts our hearts and strengthens our faith as only music can.

TRAVELERS



What is on the Inside??

I recently watched the animated movie, "Inside Out". It is a delightful children's movie that will make you smile and laugh and cry, but it will also make you think about the events in your life that have helped to shape you; it will make you think about the depths of your soul; it will make you think about what is on the inside.

The main character, Riley, is a happy, hockey-loving 11-year-old Midwestern girl, but her world turns upside-down when she and her parents move to San Francisco. Riley's emotions are 'personified' as we get a glimpse into the inner workings of her soul. *Joy* tries to remain in control through this life-changing event, but eventually, the stress of the move brings *Sadness* to the forefront. When *Joy* and *Sadness* are inadvertently swept into the far reaches of Riley's mind, the only emotions left in 'Headquarters' are *Anger, Fear* and *Disgust*. During the course of the movie, *Joy* tries so hard to stay in control and to avoid letting any other emotion come to the surface. In the end, she finally learns that *Sadness* is not something her beloved Riley should avoid, but rather it is something she should acknowledge and "feel what needs feeling."

As in many children's stories, there is a profound message for adults. The events of our past can effect us deeply and life-changing experiences can cause all kinds of emotions to surface... sadness, anger, fear, disgust. And so it is with any of us at one time or another...emotions bubble up that, often times, we never knew were there. The Pines Stephen Ministers are here for such times. They bring the blessing of a listening presence and caring heart, and help their care receivers know that it is okay to "feel what needs feeling" and in that, eventually find healing and wholeness by the grace of God. Prior to teaching my first children's Sunday School class 20 years ago, a wise woman provided some sage advice — "While the children will retain only a small percentage of what you say, they will always remember if they felt loved".

One of the reasons I love the Pines family is the many ways in which I observe love being shared among people of all ages. While developing a comprehensive list of all the ways this is done would be a lengthy task, I wanted to share a note I recently received from Matthew Ward who was a member of Pines until he entered high school. During that time, two of the wonderful saints at Pines, Charles and Frances Cawthon, served as Matthew's prayer pals. Matthew, who is now a freshman at Texas Tech University, gave me permission to share the following excerpt from a recent email:

On a different note, I've been refereeing intramural football at Texas Tech for a part time job and got to take part in something really special yesterday. On Tuesday nights the intramural sports department teams up with the Special Olympics and does something called unified flag football, with each team consisting of at least half of their players being adults with mental disabilities. It was really a special occasion, as a fairly large crowd of students came out to cheer them on, as well as most of the kids' parents. It was pretty incredible to be a part of making those people's days, and the number of students willing to take an hour out of their day to come support them made me think my generation is going to be okay. I couldn't stop thinking about Mr. Charles and Frances (Cawthon) and how lucky I was to grow up at Pines.

After reading Matthew's email, I concluded that he continues to remember AND experience love from the Pines church family. During this season of Thanksgiving, this leads me to give thanks for the multitude of ways that members of the Pines family share love with each other and with others in need. There are no age limits nor boundaries on how or when this love is shared nor on the lasting impact it has on the lives of those involved. Thanks be to God for this grace-filled gift.

News from Center Ministries...

In addition to the middle and high school students that Mark Trotter's group feeds each week and leads in bible study, the need has risen to work with the elementary aged children. So, on Tuesday nights, Center Ministries works with the middle and high school youth (up to 75 kids now) and now on Wednesdays, they have begun working with elementary aged children (see picture below).

They meet every week, see the time schedule below. 40 years ago Eugene Peterson published his 1st book - <u>A Long Obedience in the Same Direction</u>. For years and years I've been jealous of that title, wishing I'd said it myself. The book is a study of the 15 Psalms we know as Songs of Ascent (Ps. 120-134), and was the first step toward his widely known translation of the entire Bible - <u>The Message</u>. These Psalms were most likely used by generations of faithful Jews as walking and climbing hymns, sung as they made their way up the hills to Jerusalem on annual pilgrimages. Peterson suggests that these songs were vital elements of the Jews' long obedience to God's call, strengthening them to remain faithful century after century.

As Christian disciples, we are called individually and collectively to a similar long obedience to that same call of God - to an ever-growing, lifelong faithfulness to Jesus' gracious invitation to come follow him. The road to Jerusalem was neither smooth nor level. And neither are the pathways of our own lives. Sometimes it seems there is no road there at all – only bumps and surprises and dangers, troubles, and heartaches. Songs of Ascent can still help us along the way, but today, here at Pines PC, we are singularly blessed to have even more tools of assistance and encouragement at our disposal. Stephen Ministry is one of them.

When your road disappears completely, or gets impossibly difficult to manage, there is a Stephen Minister ready to come alongside, to walk with you, to pray for and with you, to be a faithful Christian listener and friend. The relationship is confidential, free, and encouraging. For Stephen Ministers, their service is an integral part of their own long obedience to Christ's call.
