Pastor's Page

Grace and Peace in the name of Christ,

As I write this article I am bursting with excitement for the upcoming journey to eastern Europe and the famous Oberammergau Passion Play! This trip has been four years in the making, and we are finally going on June 1st. The 26 travelers and I will visit the great eastern European cities of Prague and Budapest, and then make our way to the Bavarian region with stops in Vienna, Munich and our grand destination Oberammergau. The Passion Play of Oberammergau has been taking place ever since the end of the Bubonic Plague in 1633. The plague had entered the town and killed 84 people. The frightened villagers gathered together and prayed to God that God would spare them anymore death from the plague, and if God saved the town they would show their thanks and give praise to God through the telling of Jesus' final days. And the rest is as they say, history. The play has been performed every 10 years ever since, with the exception of three times due to war and disease. The play was originally performed on Pentecost, but now it begins May 15 and runs every day through September.

The people of Oberammergau take this commitment to God very seriously as the whole village takes part in some portion of the play. The cast is made up of 2,500 towns people, and you have to be born in, or have lived in Oberammergau for 20 years to be able to participate. Rehearsals begin a year before opening day and men are required to let their beards and hair grow beginning Ash Wednesday. I told you these people take this offering to God seriously. Our 27 travelers will be among 4,500 of our closest friends as we watch the 5 hour long play, which by the way is performed all in German!

German! Yes, the whole play... all 5 hours... is performed in German. So, I know what you're thinking, "How will we understand what they're saying if we don't speak or understand German?" I think the same question was asked on Pentecost so many years ago. Act 2 verses 8-12 says, "Then how is it that each of us hears them in our native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!" Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?"" The answer to our question is, we will understand because they will be declaring the wonders of God. The gift of the Holy Spirit will allow us to understand because they are sharing the mighty acts of God. It is the love of Christ Jesus that will allow us to understand because this story has been written on our hearts.

We may not always understand what someone is saying, and they might not understand us, but if we say it with love, and our love is a witness to God then no mater the language difference or generation gap we will understand and be understood.


Children and Youth

STEWARDSHIP NOTES:

- 1. Pledge income in April is slightly below forecast for the 4 months. Non-pledge income is significantly below forecast.
- 2. Overall, committee expenses were on track vs. budget expectations. Mission expenditures are accrued on a 1/12th basis each month; Staff committee is right on budget; Property and several other committee expenses were below forecast. Worship committee paid one time annual music license fees in April, in addition to expenses for Easter services.
- 3. Total Income was \$191,550; total expenses were \$212,382; leaving a Net Loss of \$19,832 for the year.
- 4. The Stewardship committee is beginning our financial audit process with a review of written procedures and policies, as well as a risk control self-analysis.
- 5. The Stewardship committee and trustees will meet with the Texas Presbyterian Foundation relationship manager in late May to review our Sustaining Gift Fund.

- approved Rev. Bill Willis and Rev. Shawn Kang to fill the pulpit and serve communion as needed
- •approved the service of marriage of Katherine Allison at Pines on August 20, 2022, to be officiated by Rev. Gans and Rev. Mark England of Kinsmen Lutheran Church, and the service of communion at the wedding officiated by the Rev. Gans
- •approved optional robing for the pastor and choir after Memorial Day
- heard a report from the Property Committee how everyone worked well together at the successful May workday, with another workday tentatively scheduled for November
- endorsed a suggestion that if anyone in the Congregation sees something that needs to be updated or changed, please bring it to the attention of anyone on Session

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at **Pines Presbyterian Church on Tuesday**, **July 19**, **2022**.

A package of five screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.¹

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²

Osteoporosis Risk

An ultrasound is performed to measure the shin bone for abnormal bone mass density. This can help assess the risk of osteoporosis, a disease where bones become weak and brittle.
